California Historical Landmarks




- Created by Legislation in 1931

Landmark Criteria

- The first, last, only, or most significant of its type in the state or within a large geographic region
- Associated with an individual or group having a profound influence on the history of California
- A prototype of, or an outstanding example of, a period, style, architectural movement or construction or is one of the more notable works or the best surviving work in a region of a pioneer architect, designer or master builder

Point Criteria

- The first, last, only, or most significant of its type in the state or within a local geographic region (**city or county**)
- Associated with an individual or group having a profound influence on the history of California
- A prototype of, or an outstanding example of, a period, style, architectural movement or construction or is one of the more notable works or the best surviving work in a region of a pioneer architect, designer or master builder







What is a Historic District?



A significant concentration, linkage, or continuity of sites, buildings, structures, or objects united historically or aesthetically by plan or physical development.

Characteristics of Historic Districts

- Significant within a historic context
- Registration criteria
- Retain integrity
- Defined by precise geographic boundaries
- Conveys a strong sense of past time and place
- Reflect one principle activity or several interrelated
- Encompass variety of resources



Pisgah Home Historic District

- Local Level of Significance
- Criterion A: Associated with development of religious organizations and social philanthropy in Los Angeles
- Areas of Significance:
 - Social History
 - Religion
 - Philosophy
- Period of Significance:
1895-1936





Hagemann Ranch Historic District

- Local Level of Significance
- Criterion C: Type, Period, Method of Construction
- Area of Significance:
 - Architecture (Vernacular)
 - Layout of ranch properties in Livermore Valley
 - Common buildings: houses, barns, outbuildings, tank house
 - Plank-frame construction; Wood-frame, post and beam construction
- Period of Significance 1870-1930




Cowell Lime Works Historic District

- Local Level of Significance
- Criterion A: Important Associations with local industry
- Area of Significance: Industry
 - Relate to limestone quarrying and lime production
 - Industrial and ranch-related buildings, structures, and objects
 - Wood-frame and limestone masonry construction



Jackson Downtown Historic District



- Period of Significance 1857-1949




Bungalow Heaven Historic District

- Local Level of Significance
- Criterion C: Bungalow style of the Arts and Crafts period
- Area of Significance: Architecture
- Period of Significance: 1888-1929
- Submitted under the Registration Requirements of the Multiple Property documentation, "The Residential Architecture of Pasadena, California: The Influence of the Arts and Crafts Movement"



What is a Multiple Property Submission?



Multiple Property Submission (MPS)

- Facilitates registration
- Establishes significance and integrity criteria
- Streamlines the organization of survey data and research
- Provides a framework for evaluation



Components of a MPS

- Multiple Property Documentation Form
 - Identifies subject
 - Identified historic context(s)
 - Associated property types
 - Registration requirements
- Individual Nominations

- Associated Historic Contexts:
 - Economic Development of Point Arena, 1859-1940
 - Residential Building in Point Arena, 1859-1940
 - Institutions in Point Arena, 1859-1940



Property Types

- Commercial buildings
- Wood frame constructed houses
- Schools, churches, and fraternal halls



Point Arena's MPS Registration Requirements

- Residential Buildings
 - Constructed between 1859-1940
 - Clear examples of domestic architecture of the period
 - Retain original form, room sized-additions only in the rear
 - Replacements must be in kind and only have minor alterations that do not impact the historic character

Can a property be listed if an owner objects?




Depends On:

stop if the owner objects?




Yes and No

- Landmarks and Points require written support from the property owner accompany the nomination
- National Register and California Register nominations can be heard by the State Historical Resources Commission even if a private owner objects to the listing. It is possible for these properties to receive a determination of eligibility



Why Register a Property?



Benefits

- Fosters pride of place and appreciation of cultural heritage
- Maintains and enhances property values
- Establishes eligibility for federal funding and tax incentives
- Provides economic and other incentives to promote conservation and preservation
- Sustains or improves quality of life by maintaining neighborhood character
