Crystal Cove: One of California's Newest Historical Landmarks

On January 31, 2014, dignitaries, State Parks staff,





and local citizens, gathered at Crystal Cove State Park for the grand opening of the park's new environmental loop trail. This was a kick-off event for the 150th anniversary of California State Parks, which will be commemorated by events throughout the year. As part of the Crystal Cove event, a plaque was unveiled recognizing Crystal Cove

Historic District's designation as California Historical Landmark #1050. The Crystal Cove plaque is the first in a statewide project that will mark the 150th anniversary by designating new California Historical Landmarks and placing plaques at existing Landmark sites (Parks' 150th Committee co-chairs, Donna Pozzi and Mike Lynch, are pictured above). The Crystal Cove plaque was funded by the Crystal Cove Alliance and California State Parks. Other plaques will be funded by the Native Sons of the Golden West, with cooperation from the California State Parks Foundation.
